Grammar – ‘-s’, ‘-es’, ‘-ies’, ‘-ves’ (singular and plural)

‘Singular’ means one. **‘Plural’** means more than one. There are different rules for changing nouns from singular to plural.

For most words, just add an ‘s’ .	cat → cat s
Words ending in a consonant and then ‘y’ : change the ‘y’ to ‘ies’	sky → sk ies
Words ending in ‘s’ , ‘x’ , ‘z’ , ‘sh’ , ‘ch’ , ‘ss’ or a consonant and then ‘o’ : add ‘es’	buzz → buzz es
Words ending in ‘f’ or ‘fe’ : remove the ‘f’ or ‘fe’ and add ‘ves’	calf → cal ves
Some words are irregular and don't change at all.	sheep → sheep
Other words have a completely different spelling when plural.	foot → feet
